### ABOUT THE 'KINCHI' PROJECT FUNDED BY THE KOREAN INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION AGENCY (KOICA)



## **PROJECT DESCRIPTION**

From 2015 to 2019, the project covered 8 out 17 districts in Cabo Delgado, representing 70% of the provincial population

A joint United Nations Program, led by UNFPA in partnership with WHO, and funded by the Korea International Cooperation Agency (KOICA), KIMCHI supported the Government of Mozambique to reduce maternal and new-born morbidity and mortality in Mozambique and Cabo Delgado.

The programme aimed to reinforce the demand and access to quality maternal and sexual and reproductive health services for hard-to-reach areas of Cabo Delgado. In addition to the work of activists, community-based family planning was also driven by other activities, including mobile clinics that traveled to communities and schools, running information and awareness campaigns, distributing condoms, and performing HIV tests.

#### OBJECTIVES

1. Reinforce the health system to improve the availability of maternal and neonatal health services and increase access for the target population

2. Strengthen the involvement and capacity of communities in the promotion of maternal and neonatal health

**3.** Increase and improve the quality of maternal and neonatal health services

4. Increase commitment and mobilization of resources and strengthen coordination and M&E mechanisms to ensure the implementation of the Integrated Plan to Achieve MDGs 4&5





# **TARGETS ACHIEVED**

347.

Use of family planning methods, surpassing the target of 29%

The unmet need for family planning was reduced to 14%, surpassing the goal of 19.5%



The proportion of deliveries attended by a qualified health provider reached 86% versus a target of 76%

Percent of women and men informed of the service package relating to sexual and reproductive health including HIV/AIDS, surpassing the goal of 43%



Increase in new users of family planning was documented at health facilities during the current reporting period, surpassing the goal of 38%

Women recieved postnatal care within the first 48 hours after birth. Improving from 78.7%, just falling short of the 93.7% target



39,507

New users (out of 128,334) of family planning were reached, contributing to 24 per cent of the provincial annual target for new users in Cabo Delgado
